Reports from Commissioners:

Mayor gave the Police Activity Report for the month of February 2018 total 312 calls. (copy attached). Comm. Golden reported 71 work orders, and the list is available.

Comm. Maxwell informed the public that the borough will be implementing furlough days for every employee except the police department, borough will be closed every Friday and the meeting date has changed. The borough is working out payment agreements with the Chief and her attorney for the jury award. He continued that the fireworks are cancelled, 50% pay reduction for commissioners and that there will be a \$ 6.5 cent tax increase but it should be offset by a \$ 3.5 cent school tax decrease.

Prior to opening the meeting up for public comment, Mayor Fox explained that the borough along with bond counsel, borough auditors, Comm. Golden and Admin. Ridings had a meeting with the state regarding bonding for the 1.8 million dollar award, it was a very difficult meeting, they wanted us to merge with another town and increase taxes eleven cents or \$2,000 per household in one year. The Chief and her attorney will take time payments; the Attorney payout over 3.5 years, and the Chief 8-10 years. The borough will be furloughing employees, including the Chief, CFO and Clerk who have voluntarily agreed to them. There will be no family festival, we will have the July 4th parade, and the borough will be closed on Fridays to save electricity. With a 6.5 cent tax increase and an offset of school tax of 3.5 cents the tax increase will be 2.8 cents. The borough has a huge debt that was not created by this administration. This was a dangerous situation, you never go after a female, and she deserves to get what she got. The Mayor continued that taxes are not going up \$2,000, that is a rumor.

Mayor opened the meeting to floor for public comment.

<u>TONY WELLS</u>, 627 W. Pine Avenue, commented that this is a lot of money, can't justify the amount. He questioned the \$1.8 million dollars and wanted to know exactly what happened, wants to understand what happened. Tony questioned why such a large amount, let the town understand, it is crazy what's going on. Solicitor commented emotion distress contributed to the amount.

Mayor stated that the Chief, a Lieutenant at the time was illegally fired. She loves this town that is why she is taking payments.

Tony asked if she could change her mind.

Mayor stated she can change her mind.

<u>MIKE DOBSON</u>, 600 North Drive. Asked what has to put into place to prevent this from happening, for elected officials to be held accountable

Mayor stated that there were many lawsuits, not just this one, insurance didn't care, and Scott worked with him.

Comm. Golden stated it was a dangerous situation with a rogue mayor who didn't follow advice. Mike asked why the elected official be held accountable.

Solicitor commented that you can't fire an elected official, and if you don't indemnify them no one would want that position.

Mike continued why was the former official let out of the suit.

Solicitor commented, although he was not the attorney assigned to this case, Mr. Barbone was the attorney, he is one of the best trial attorneys in South Jersey, it was probably a strategy decision to let out the former official. Insurance would not cover punitive damages. This has been going on a long time.

Comm. Maxwell commented that if there are any problems with employees it all gets documented and before anyone is let go we consult with Labor Counsel. He continued and stated that the borough has paid out over \$900,000.00, that's the end of the lawsuits.

Mike commented as long as they listen to Labor Counsel and wanted to know since it's the end of the lawsuits will taxes go down since that \$900,000.00 will be there now.

<u>TONY WELLS</u>, 627 W. Pine Avenue, commented no insurance involved. Mayor, stated correct, the former mayor turned everything upside down.

<u>CARL O'HALA</u>, 624 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that the \$900,000.00 that was paid out isn't there now it was used over a number of years from the same surplus funds.

Mayor Fox stated that the former mayor was in for four years and turned everything upside down.

MARIE POWELL, 742 W. Glenwood Avenue, asked if it was too late to file a counter-suit. Solicitor confirmed that is too late, the attorney would have had to keep him in. Marie continued and asked about the payments, payment schedule and payment time, if there was an agreement. Mayor stated that there is a 90 day clause for payment in full in the agreement. Solicitor informed the public that this is a judgement rendered by a jury and she can demand payment in full. Comm. Maxwell stated if there was no escape clause they would not do payments. Marie asked if elected officials get any training, ethics training. Mayor responded that JIF provides annual training; all Commissioners attend and must sign in. Marie continued asking if it would be considered to do an indemnification resolution to protect the residents. Solicitor stated that the problem is that the municipality is always named. Comm. Golden interjected that it is like a suing a LLC business, they just go out of business and you don't get anything. Marie stated that is not true, she does it all the time.

KAREN KEIRSEY, 651 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that the \$1.8 million dollars was appealed. Solicitor said that a basis to appeal means that the judge may have done something wrong or jury. Karen, looking at this as a person who is paying taxes to keep property - why no appeal? Solicitor, stated attorney/client privilege. Karen asked what happened with the insurance company. Mayor stated the borough is waiting on the judge's decision, but it doesn't sound good. Karen asked why JIF is not covering and why was this not appealed. Solicitor stated they denied coverage (JIF). Karen asked if anything has been put in place since Mayor Frederick was in office to avoid this from happening again. Solicitor stated that the Chief was placed back in employment hoping it would limit the borough exposure. Mayor Fox stated that what the Commissioners did bring her back which resulted in no punitive damages. Solicitor stated that is not a crazy number, earlier this year there was an award of four million, and Cape May City was \$800,000, also if the borough loses, then the attorney can assess fees. Karen stated that it's a lot of money for a little town, it's not who gets the money, if this continues it will bankrupt the borough and we are left holding the bag.

Mayor Fox informed her that this is the last one and there have been no lawsuits since we walked in, we didn't do it.

<u>DENNIS FIFE</u>, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, agrees with Karen about the appeal. We did right, brought her back, isn't that enough of a reason for an appeal, and over a four year period the chief went from \$62k to \$101k, and \$800,000.00 for emotional distress. Solicitor stated that doesn't come out in trial. Mayor stated you can't appeal emotional and if you did it would cost more money. Mr. Fife continued and asked what the difference is between furloughed and a lay-off; Solicitor Blaney stated that there is no real

difference. Mr. Fife continued stating that the Chief got back vacation/sick back pay over 700 hours. Mayor stated the commissioners feel bad, but this is not the end of the world, this is the last one, we didn't do this. Mr. Fife stated that changing the meeting times to 9:00am is shutting down the public, he wants to be heard at meetings, and can they be video- taped. Mayor stated they will not be taped.

<u>MARIE OWENS</u>, 742 W. Glenwood Avenue, asked if the meetings could be at 7:00pm on Wednesdays. Mayor state the meetings will be put back to Friday's at 7:00pm after everything is done. Discussion ensued between the Commissioners regarding the change of time for the meetings, no change in time, clerk is furloughed on Fridays, and the Commissioners will discuss meeting times at the scheduled April meeting at 9:00am.

<u>CARL O'HALA</u>, 624 W. Poplar Avenue, stated that furloughed employees have to line up work to make up loss with other jobs.

JOE KLINE, 750 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that this was caused by wrongful termination, right? You knew she was suing us, you offered her back pay, job back and knew she was suing us. Solicitor stated this was a civil suit regarding termination, disciplinary matters at the local level with hearing officers, political affiliations, not an issue of back pay, illegal discriminatory, unlawful termination. By bring her back it helped with no punitive damages. Mayor commented that the award was \$1.165 million \$1.8 includes attorney fees. Solicitor stated that the jury doesn't know that attorney fees are assessed, at the time the judge can use a multiplier for attorney fees. Mr. Kline continued and asked why the suit wasn't dropped prior to bringing her back. If you knew she was still going to carry through with the suit, why weren't there negotiations for the people, if you made her whole why did she still carry the suit through? Mayor commented that you would owe more, double. Mr. Kline state he doesn't agree with the mayor's previous statement, why didn't JIF pay, why is there no coverage? Mayor stated we have to listen to our attorneys, sometimes we don't agree. Solicitor that we're not JIF, they view it and felt that by bringing her back undercut their position. Mr. Kline asked what we are doing, are we suing JIF to get coverage? Mayor informed him that it is in the Judge's hand. Solicitor said you make a decision to appeal JIF decision, which is more likely to get overturned, Judges don't like to get overturned. Mayor stated that the borough appealed the attorney fees, and to appeal the decision would cost \$70,000.00 to appeal and increase taxes 3 cents. Comm. Golden commented that we have to pay it.

<u>KAREN KEIRSEY</u>, 651 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that employees are taking time off, losing money, then paying taxes, it double jeopardy. This is an egregious amount of money, is there anything in process to have a defense. Mayor stated that attorney makes decisions and we listen to them.

<u>PAUL MATUSZAK</u>, 612 W. Poplar Avenue, asked it money was set aside when the Chief was brought back. Comm. Maxwell informed him that the Chief who was a Lieutenant at the time and her salary was supposed to be put aside but it wasn't. When this administration took over there were at least six other lawsuits, there was no money to put aside, over \$900,000.00 paid out. Mr. Matuszak continued and stated with the tax increases, taxes raised to cover that debt, paying out of \$900,000.00 can you use that (\$900,000.00) that is raised in taxes to cover that debt? Comm. Maxwell stated that this is the last lawsuit, we will have to pay over \$200,000.00 a year for 3.5 years to the attorney and \$60,000.00 a year to the chief. Mr. Matuszak asked if the money is allocated to pay the Chief, and attorney then what happens to the \$6.5 cent tax raise, is that to pay her. Comm. Maxwell said that \$60,000.00 is over "x" amount of years.

<u>JOE KLINE</u>, 750 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that JIF should pay us, because we paid her. Solicitor stated that JIF believed that bringing her back was detrimental to their case. JIF only pays out certain amounts.

<u>RICHARD SPINETTA</u>, 718 W. Maple Avenue, asked if the town is liable and not covered by insurance, and if the judgement amount is solely in the hands of the jury. Solicitor confirmed, clarified that if the plaintiff prevails then her attorney fees are included, he stated that the Judge looks at the attorney fees submitted and can due a fee enhancement adjustment, the jury is not informed of the prevailing attorney fees.

<u>MARIE POWELL</u>, 742 W. Glenwood Avenue, JIF made the decision not to cover and no appeal was filed, who were the individuals? Solicitor explained that coverage was denied prior to the award.

<u>TONY WELLS</u>, 627 W. Pine Avenue, asked if the borough owns anything that could be disposed of to offset the costs. Mayor stated that the borough doesn't have a lot of assets.

<u>DENNIS FIFE</u>, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, commented about the \$6.5 cent tax increase. Mayor Fox stated that for every \$20,000.00 is approximately \$.01 cent tax rate, with furloughs that increases to \$.11 to \$.12 cents or about \$130,000.00, doing cuts.

<u>CARL O'HALA</u>, 624 W. Poplar Avenue, explained that the \$700-900 thousand dollars that was already paid out won't be collected again to be paid out, it would be like paying Peter by cutting Paul in half, \$100,000.00 the first year; it keeps perpetuating, that money is gone and won't be paid back.

<u>PAUL MATUSZAK</u>, 612 W. Poplar Avenue, stated that the rug was cut out from under them, and asked if there was any conference between JIF and borough attorneys stating that if you do this you're on your own, any communication? Comm. Golden stated there was no communication, they walked away. Mr. Matuszak asked if there was any conference prior to the back pay. Comm. Maxwell and Comm. Golden both didn't recall.

JOE KLINE, 750 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned bringing back the Lieutenant jeopardized coverage? Comm. Golden stated there were a lot of things going on, the Police Department was being run by a patrolman, and the Prosecutor's office gave us a week to get the PD in compliance, so we sat down with our solicitor at the time and decided to bring her back, cut our losses. Mr. Kline stated she wouldn't come back with back pay, it's completely opposite of what you do and the solicitor didn't have a discussion with JIF. Comm. Golden stated they took the advice of legal counsel at the time. Mr. Kline stated that this was a bad deal, have one or the other but not both.

<u>DENNIS FIFE</u>, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, asked if the borough can go after the attorney for bad advice. Solicitor stated that at the end of the day, no harm was created. Mr. Fife disagreed and stated that it is costing us.

<u>PAUL MATUSZAK</u>, 612 W. Poplar Avenue, stated so this was done on our own. Solicitor commented to go against the attorney will cause additional harm.

<u>MARIE POWELL</u>, 742 W. Glenwood Avenue, asked if there were settlement discussions prior to the jury trial to resolve the lawsuit. Solicitor didn't know if they did, he explained the process if the suit including court ordered mediation. Ms. Powell commented that she was surprised, if it was wrong why didn't we make an offer, and questioned if the borough could have settled this for \$100,000.00, now she hit the lottery. Ms. Powell continued asking if there were settlement discussions. Both Comm. Maxwell and Comm. Golden didn't recall. Mayor Fox stated that we can't go back, this is what we have to deal with, and he appreciates you coming to the meetings, and stated that we are going to get through this. The

Mayor continued stating that if anyone has questions they can call the borough and he will return the calls, we are transparent.

<u>PAUL MATUSZAK</u>, 612 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that during this litigation you opted to raise your pay, you gave yourself a raise during this time. Mayor stated that they (Commissioners) have taken a 50% pay cut. Mr. Matuszak asked the salary, the Mayor didn't recall the amount.

<u>DENNIS FIFE</u>, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, commented on the amount of raises to employees, 66% to the Chief over four (4) years – Why? The real world gets 3%. Mr. Fife pointed out a ratio comparison of residents to police officers and costs. Solicitor commented that she is the lowest payed chief in the county. Mr. Fife asked if she was full time and if the mayor is the public safety director. Mayor Fox confirmed that she was full time and he was the public safety director.

<u>PAUL MATUSZAK</u>, 612 W. Poplar Avenue, asked if the borough would do shared services for police. Mayor Fox stated he would not consider it.

<u>DENNIS FIFE</u>, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that we can't afford it and don't compare apples and oranges. Mayor Fox stated it wasn't his fault that you can't afford two properties. Mr. Fife continued and asked how many residents, and if the police (shared services) had a sector to patrol they would have to do it. Mayor Fox state he likes having our own police and stated that they wouldn't stay in their sector, he didn't when he was a police officer.

<u>MARIE OWENS</u>, 742 W. Glenwood Avenue, stated that she heard that taxes were going up \$2,000.00. Mayor Fox informed her that was not so, and gave her approximate figures on homes assessed at \$175,000 would increase \$49.00; \$250,000.00 increase of \$70.00; value \$500,000. Increase of \$140.

<u>DENNIS FIFE</u>, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that it would be \$2,000.00 if it was paid out all at one in one year. Mayor stated that the local finance board didn't give us any long time.

<u>BEN MAZZARELLA</u>, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, asked if there was an agreement with the chief. Solicitor stated that she is willing to sign the agreement, but needs to leave her options open.

MARIE POWELL, 742 W. Glenwood Avenue, asked how many years.

Hearing no more public comment, the Mayor closed the public portion and thanked everyone for coming out.

Clerk asked for a motion to adjourn.

ORDINANCE 565 (2018)

AMENDING LAND USE DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT MARIJUANA DISPENSARIES IN THE BOROUGH OF WEST WILDWOOD, COUNTY OF CAPE MAY, NEW JERSEY

WHEREAS, the Borough of West Wildwood has a comprehensive land use development ordinance which identifies permitted uses in each zone and prohibits uses which are not expressly permitted; and

WHEREAS, recreational marijuana dispensaries may become legal in the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, consideration has been given into whether there are any appropriate zones in the Borough of West Wildwood for the location of either medical or recreational marijuana dispensaries;

WHEREAS, there does not appear to be an area for such a facility without, churches, parks, playgrounds or residential zones within a quarter mile;

WHEREAS, given the safety and security concerns inherent with medical and recreational marijuana dispensaries it is in the public's interest for the West Wildwood community to be free of such dispensaries.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Board of Commissioners, of the Borough of West Wildwood, County of Cape May, New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1.

The Borough of West Wildwood Land Use Development Ordinance, is hereby amended, Prohibited Uses, Section 1 General Provisions, 1-5, as follows:

All uses not expressly permitted in this Ordinance are prohibited, <u>including</u>, <u>but</u> not limited to, medicinal and recreational marijuana dispensaries.

Section 2. Repealer.

All Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of their inconsistencies.

Section 3. Severance Provision.

If any provision herein shall be found to be unenforceable by reason of law, then it shall be severed from the remainder of this section with the remainder remaining in full force and effect.

Section 4. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall become effective 20 days from final passage into law.

ORDINANCE 566 (2018)

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING ORDINANCE 106 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ERECTION, REBUILDING, MAINTENANCE REPAIR AND KEEPING IN REPAIR OF BULKHEADS AND OTHER WORKS AND STRUCTURES ALONG ALL NAVIGABLE WATERS, OTHER THAN THE ATLANTIC OCEAN, WITHIN THE BOROUGH OF WEST WILDWOOD, INCLUDING THE FILLING IN AND GRADING OF LAND AROUND AND ABOUT SAID BULKHEADS OR STRUCTURES ACCORDING TO THE SPECIFICATIONS ESTABLISHED BY SAID BOROUGH AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE COST THEREOF." AND ESTABLISHING REGULATIONS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, RECONSTRUCTION, RENOVATION AND REPAIR OF BULKHEADS WITHIN THE BOROUGH OF WEST WILDWOOD

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Borough of West Wildwood has reviewed the existing Ordinance of the Borough pertaining to the regulations for the construction, renovation or repair of existing or new bulkheads within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Borough of West Wildwood has deemed it necessary and in the best interest of the citizens of West Wildwood to repeal and replace Ordinance No. 106; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Board of Commissioners of the Borough of West Wildwood, County of Cape May, State of New Jersey as follows:

SECTION I. Bulkheads within the Borough of West Wildwood shall be maintained in such a condition so that they shall pose no danger to the health, safety or welfare of the residents of the Borough of West Wildwood or to public or private property within the Borough of West Wildwood. Bulkheads shall be kept in a state of repair so as to prevent erosion or damage to adjoining or other properties. Whenever a bulkhead has deteriorated or suffered damage to such a degree that a danger to the property or adjoining properties is present, the Zoning Official, Code Enforcement Official or the Borough Engineer shall notify the property owner in writing to the address that is set forth in the Borough's tax records, of the nature of the deterioration of damage and require the owner to make the necessary repairs. The property owner shall take corrective action within sixty (60) days from the date of notice.

SECTION II. Bulkhead replacement and repairs must comply with the CAFRA rules and regulations as determined by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection.

- a. The contractor shall make every effort to replace each section as removed so as not to unduly endanger life and property.
- b. Materials for sheathing may be wood, vinyl, fiberglass, galvanized steel or composite.
- c. Sheathing shall be driven equally below the mud line (example 8 feet above mud line/8 feet below mud line). Unless supported by Engineer drawings.

- d. All pilings must comply with CAFRA standards due to environmental impact.
- e. All whalers must be a minimum of 6x6 including top and mid-whale construction, and shall be marine grade lumber as per CAFRA regulations.
- f. All hardware utilized must be hot dipped galvanized or stainless steel.
- g. Tie rods and deadman tie rods must be ¾ inch diameter or greater and attached to a deadman which is 10 feet back on the landward side. Tie rods are to be a minimum of 5 feet on center. The deadman can be concrete or piling.
- h. Height of the top of any replacement bulkhead must be at elevation 8.5 feet.
- i. Backfill must be of sandy fill material with a minimum finish grade to be at elevation 6.5 feet which must run at this height for a distance of 6 feet landward of the bulkhead.
- j. When a bulkhead is found to be in a state of disrepair allowing for the intrusion of water to the landward of the bulkhead during a normal high tide, the property owner must make the appropriate repairs or replacement so as to prevent a danger to the adjoining properties and general public. Corrective action shall take place within sixty (60) days from the date of notice.
- k. Drains in the bulkhead used for the equalization of pressure are prohibited.
- Authorization from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and any other state or federal agency having jurisdiction over the property affected by the work must be made where required.

SECTION III. Violations and Penalties

- 1. Penalties.
 - a. For the violation of any provision of the Ordinance, the maximum penalty, upon conviction of the violation, shall be a fine not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or both.

SECTION IV. Severability. If for any reason any section of the Ordinance shall be declared illegal by any Court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining section of the Ordinance shall remain in full effect, notwithstanding.

SECTION V. Repealer. Any Ordinance or provision thereof inconsistent with the Ordinance is hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION VI. Publication. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon the adoption and publication accordance with the law.

RESOLUTION 2018-024

OPPOSING OFFSHORE OIL AND GAS ACTIVITIES

WHEREAS, the Borough of West Wildwood promotes preservation of, and concern for the environment, its citizens, and the unique wildlife that live and migrate through the Borough and its surrounding area; and

WHEREAS, certain activities raise a general concern for their potential impact on our environment and wildlife; and

WHEREAS, on January 8, 2018, the federal Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) announced in the Federal Register notice the release of their Draft Proposed Program (DPP) for the 2019-2014 Outer Continental Shelf Oil and Gas Leasing Program. BOEM is requesting public comment on the DPP as well as formal scoping for a Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement for the 2019-2024 Program; and

WHEREAS, this new plan includes the entire Atlantic Ocean from Maine to Florida, including the waters off New Jersey within 3 miles of beaches, as well as including other ocean areas totaling some 90% of US ocean waters; and

WHEREAS, the Jersey Shore is essential to the health of our communities, environment and the thriving economy of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, the physical, hydrodynamic, and biological characteristics of the ocean off the Jersey Shore are unique in the world, as more than 300 species of fish, nearly 350 species of birds, 5 species of sea turtles, and many marine mammals such as 20 species of whales and dolphins, 1 species of porpoise, and 4 species of seals, frequent this region. Nine endangered species, four of which are whales, can be found in these ocean waters, including the Atlantic Right Whale, one of the world's most endangered marine mammals. The region also serves as an essential migratory pathway for many of these species; and

WHEREAS, the Jersey Shore sustains the economy of the region with its bounty of natural resources and intrinsic values for millions of people through tourism. Tourism brings more than \$44 billion to NJ's economy each year and provides jobs to more than 500,000 people; and

WHEREAS, recreational and commercial fisheries in NJ provide enormous economic benefits, including revenue, food production, and recreational activities. In 2014, recreational fishing supported nearly 20,000 jobs and resulted in \$2 billion of retail sales. Commercial fishing supports nearly 7,300 jobs and provides \$152 million in landings, not including restaurant and retail sales; and

WHEREAS, current estimates of the amount of technically recoverable oil off the entire Atlantic coast from Main to Florida would only last the nation approximately 229 days, and the amount of technically recoverable gas would only last approximately 562 days; and

WHEREAS, offshore oil and gas development causes substantial environmental impacts, including: (a) onshore damage due to infrastructure, (b) water pollution from drilling muds and the water brought up from a well with oil and gas (called "produced waters"), (c) noise from seismic surveys, (d) air pollution, and (e) oil spills; and

WHEREAS, the harmful environmental consequences of offshore oil and gas exploration and development are serious and threaten the environmental and economic assets of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, the BP Horizon disaster in the Gulf of Mexico (2010) is clear evidence of the dangers associated with offshore drilling, including costing the live of 11 people, devastating coastal economies and countless livelihoods, and killing countless marine animals, as well as continuing to cause harm to marine life as documents by a steady flow of studies; and

WHEREAS, Federal Administration officials are also weakening protections of ocean resources by undermining rules and regulations, cutting funding sources for spill response; and

WHEREAS, oil spills travel vast distances, and the Gulf Stream and Labrador Ocean Current all flow toward New Jersey making the region vulnerable to impacts from spills anywhere in the Atlantic Ocean; and

WHEREAS, within 5 days of the release of the DPP Governor Scott from Florida was able to convince Department of the Interior Secretary Zinke to remove Florida from further consideration for drilling due to the importance of coast tourism to that state and NJ shares this same economic dependence on tourism and clean ocean economies; and

WHEREAS bi-partisan opposition against drilling off the New Jersey coast has included every Governor since 1985, and a majority of the congressional delegation and most coastal towns; and

WHEREAS, energy conservation and efficiency measures can significantly reduce the nation's need to explore and drill for nonrenewable resources such as oil and natural gas; and

WHEREAS, coastal communities have a profound interest in maintaining strong federal protections for our nation's coastal environment, as well as the economic and social benefits it supports.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners of the Borough of West Wildwood hereby opposes offshore oil and gas exploration and drilling activities that would affect the coast of New Jersey, and calls upon Secretary of the Interior Ryan K. Zinke, who oversees the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, to withdraw New Jersey and the entire Atlantic Ocean from consideration for offshore oil and gas exploration, development, or drilling.

WHEREAS, certain tenured and union employees have expressed willingness to voluntarily participate in said reduction of work hours and weekly pay in an effort to help eliminate the deficit;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of the Borough of West Wildwood, Cape May County and State of New Jersey, as follows:

- 1. The allegations of the preamble are incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. Beginning March 9, 2018 and continuing through January 1, 2019 all non-union and non-tenured employees of the Borough shall have their work hours reduced by one (1) day per week and shall have a commensurate reduction in their weekly pay. A list of the non-union and non-tenured employees to be furloughed/temporarily laid off in accordance with the aforementioned is attached as Exhibit "A". New hires to positions which are non-union and non-tenured will be similarly affected. In any given week, exceptions may be made by the Commissioner assigned to a particular department to meet operational needs.
- 3. Similarly, all union and tenured employees of the Borough shall be afforded the opportunity to have their work hours reduced by one (1) day per week and shall have a commensurate reduction in their weekly pay for the time period March 9, 2018 and continuing through January 1, 2019.
