Mayor Fox opened up the floor for public comment on ordinance 567(2018). Hearing none the Mayor closed the public hearing and the Clerk asked for a motion to adopt Ordinance 567(2018) on the second reading/public hearing.

Ordinance 567(2018) was adopted by not less than 2/3rds vote of the full membership of the governing body.

# **RESOLUTIONS: CLERK READ BY NUMBER & TITLE**

# <u>2018-030</u> – Public Hearing on Second Reading – AUTHORIZING THE READING OF THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET BY TITLE ONLY

Borough Auditor Scott Barron along with Borough CFO Elaine Crowley were also in attendance. The auditor explained that the budget has been submitted to the State for examination which occurs every three years. The State had requested further information regarding some housekeeping issues, which has provided, however at this time the State has not yet responded back to the Borough in order to adopt the budget.. The Auditor advises to table Resolution 2018-030 regarding the final adoption of the CY2018 until state approval is received. Mayor Fox explained that the public hearing regarding the budget will still be held at this time.

Prior to opening up the public hearing on the budget Mayor Fox explained that there is a six and a half cent tax increase, however there will be a decrease in school tax which will help lessen the overall tax impact on home owners. The Auditor only has preliminary numbers on the school tax decrease at this time. The Mayor informed the public that there will be a six and a half cent tax increase, but with the school tax decrease the overall tax increase should be minimal.

Mayor Fox opened up the floor for public comment on the budget.

SUSAN CZWALINA, 547 W. Maple Avenue, asked for clarification on the FEMA overpayment, CFO informed her that the borough was aware of the overpayment in the amount of \$2,900.00. She questioned why the Chiefs' settlement was not under the line item titled judgements in the budget but that the attorney was listed under judgements. The Auditor explained that the Chief was paid out of legal last year, so it was kept the same this year. The Auditor also explained that the budget process would have to star over if there was a change greater that ten percent, any amendment to the budget would have to go back before the state for review. Ms. Czwalina questioned the calculations presented in the 20% decrease in employees' salaries which was printed in the Herald. The CFO explained that the furloughs did not start until March. Ms. Czwalina continued to question why the payout to the Chief was not it the category of judgement in the budget, because you can't figure out exactly what was being paid out, and feels that the whole amount of the money should be under judgement since it will continue for many years unless the total payment is called in. Susan asked what would happen if the whole judgment gets called in for

payment, CFO Crowley explained that the borough would have to go back before the state. Mayor Fox stated that everyone is aware of the judgement amount.

<u>GEORGE BAXAVANEOS</u>, 519 W. Poplar Avenue, stated that he supports what Susan said regarding the placement of the judgement for the Chiefs' settlement to be moved out of legal and into judgement. Mr. Baxavaneos questioned the auditor regarding this budget, which is lower than last year. The Auditor explained that the borough revenue is less this year because last year the borough received \$115,000.00 from FEMA. Mayor Fox wanted to be clear about a change in the budget judgement line item, Auditor Barron explained that the borough would have to do a budget amendment, and a hearing on the amendment would have to be advertised.

Mayor Fox and Comm. Golden instructed the auditor to prepare an amendment to the budget to incorporate the Chiefs' award under judgement in the budget document. The auditor will have it for the next meeting, provided the state gives approvals.

<u>MARYANN WELSH.</u> 741 W. Poplar Avenue, stated that she agrees with Susan, there should be transparency and there should be a separate line item or a footnote reflecting the liability of the total judgement. Ms. Welsh asked if something could be added to the bottom of the budget denoting the judgement.

The auditor explained that there is no spot to put such a disclosure, but a statement could be put on the user friendly budget noting the total liability. Solicitor noted that the borough can't single out an employee by name due to privacy concerns; however a docket number and case number could possibly be used as a reference for the judgement. Ms. Welsh stated that the claim could be called in at any time (full payment) at least everything would be transparent, the people should know, this is the issue. Solicitor clarified that this is paid out as a judgement not as the Chiefs' salary. The Auditor explained that included in the resolution for the judgement payout was an amortization schedule showing the payments.

<u>MARK MEIGHAN</u>, 606 W. Glenwood Avenue, questioned the cost for medical coverage/expenses of \$200,000 and asked the number of employees who are covered, what portion do employees pay and why Comm. Golden receives medical. CFO Crowley explained that there are nine full time employees receiving benefits, with different plan levels that may include a spouse or children. She explained that the laws governing who is eligible to receive benefits was different years ago, and as long as Comm. Golden does not have a break in service, he is eligible to receive benefits, should he leave and come back he would no longer be entitled to receive benefits.

<u>BILL MARTIN</u>, 737 W. Poplar Avenue, asked the cost for attorney fees. CFO informed him they are under legal. Mayor Fox advised him that the CFO can get that information to him. Mr. Martin inquired as to what attorney would be used going forward. Solicitor informed him that it would be the same attorney, and he is very qualified. Mr. Martin asked why you would use the same attorney after you bad mouth him.

<u>DENNIS FIFE</u>, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, commented the attorney is incompetent. He questioned the auditor about why the state questioned the salaries/wage change. The auditor explained that there was a large reduction in salaries & wages and the state wanted an explanation, the auditor informed the state that the borough implemented employee furloughs which greatly reduced this line item.

<u>NANCY (MARINO) DOUGHERTY</u> – 215 R Avenue, made a comment on the appeal about the \$30,000 against the former mayor. Mayor said we relied on the attorney's. Ms. Dougherty commented that it was a bad attorney and should be fired.

<u>MARK MEIGHAN</u>, 606 W. Glenwood Avenue, questioned the salary of the Police Chief with six officers and a \$40,000.00 raise in salary and compared the salary with Philadelphia. Mayor stated that you can't compare the two. Mr. Meighan asked if she was asked to drop the lawsuit. Mayor Fox stated that Comm. Golden negotiated terms and that she was asked to drop the lawsuit. Mr. Meighan asked if the borough had any other lawsuits. Mayor Fox stated that one has just come in regarding a seasonal officer, but can't comment. Mr. Meighan questioned the number of lawsuits between 2008 and 2012, it has been stated 19. Mayor believes more than ten. Mr. Meighan asked what "other" means in the budget and questioned the high cost of the line item phones/communication. The CFO gave an explanation of both items.

<u>BILL MARTIN</u>, 737 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned the salary of the new code enforcement officer stating that he makes double, and asked if they will be replacing a code enforcement official. The Mayor informed him that the new official does a good job and has enforcement background; no one else will be hired.

Mayor Fox asked the public to please keep their questions to the budget hearing, other questions can be asked during the open public comment portion of the meeting.

<u>GEORGE BAXAVANEOS</u>, 519 W. Poplar Avenue, asked if the Chief can recall the full amount of the money at any time. Mayor confirmed.

<u>NANCY DOUGHERTY</u> – 215 R Avenue, stated that it was a kangaroo court, no witness were called and the former mayor was never called to testify. Mayor stated it would have cost more and the settlement would have been more.

<u>MARYANN WELSH</u>, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that that the Commissioners are stewards of our money; last month consolidation of services was brought up, with the possibility of starting a petition for consolidation of services. Ms. Welsh asked if the borough shops around for cost of phone and communication services. CFO Crowley explained that those costs encompass a lot of communication services not just phones; she will speak to our QPA. Mayor stated he will not consolidate the Police Department; Comm. Golden stated he also supports our police department.

MIKE DZWONIAREK, 205 R Avenue, asked why.

<u>SUSAN CZWALINA</u>, 547 W. Maple Avenue, questioned sheet 22 of the budget for a cost of \$1,800.00 for emergency broadcast services to the City of Wildwood and asked if this is a shared service. Administrator Ridings stated that Wildwood is the lead agency.

<u>DENNIS FIFE</u>, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, asked who keeps track of the time sheets; the Chief makes \$70.00 per hour, a lot of sick time and vacation time. CFO Crowley informed him that the department heads provide the payroll, it is not her job to question it; she clarified that the time is in hours not days and will provide Mr. Fife with the information after the meeting.

Mayor Fox again asked the public to please keep their questions to the budget hearing, other questions can be asked during the open public comment portion of the meeting.

Hearing no more public comment on the budget, the Mayor closed the public hearing on the 2018 budget.

No vote was taken at this time on the adoption of the budget as the Borough is awaiting approvals from the State of New Jersey – Resolution 2018-030 was tabled until the next meeting.

Reports from Commissioners:

Mayor asked to waive the Commissioners reports at this time.

Mayor opened the meeting to floor for public comment.

GEORGE BAXAVANEOS, 519 W. Poplar Avenue, asked the reason for denial of coverage. Solicitor explained that there is a cooperation clause and when the she was put back to work the borough did not properly notify or notice the insurance company. The insurance company had no issue with bringing her back, the Judge relied on certain information. Mr. Baxavaneos continued and asked if we defended our position and if we did everything right why no coverage. Solicitor informed him that the borough did defend this, and the attorney assigned is well respected and certified. Solicitor told Mr. Baxavaneos that he could have a copy of the Judges' opinion after the meeting. Solicitor stated that it was noted in the decision that certain notifications should have been made to the insurance company, the borough now has twenty days to respond. Mr. Baxavaneous stated that the commissioners have a fiduciary responsibility to defend the borough, and asked how hiring her back implies that the previous administration was wrong. He continued and asked why she didn't sign something stating she would not sue, if not you don't bring her back. Mayor stated she did nothing wrong and the insurance company doesn't cover back pay.

HELEN REO, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned the 2012 resolutions that were passed, stating wrongfully terminated, dismissed, politically motivated, and asked who investigated those charges that determined she was fire without merit. Mayor stated that attorney's and the administrator, also Comm. Golden. Comm. Golden stated that he lived this matter for four years, he wrote numerous letters to the State DCA (Department of Community Affairs) informing them of what the former mayor was doing to employees and they did nothing. The borough was on super probation with JIF because of all the lawsuits. Ms. Reo questioned the attorney who encourage her to sue; and you passed a resolution she should file suit against the former mayor. She continued and asked if there was a report of findings that stated the charges were false. Comm. Golden stated that it was almost eight years ago, he thinks there was something. Solicitor commented that it was a different law firm and during that time frame almost every employee was fired. Solicitor explained that there were two different lawsuits from the chief, one challenging her termination, one whistle blower (CEPA) case; when she was put back to work that resolved the first case. Solicitor informed the public that the opinion is public record and a copy is available.

STEVEN THOMPSON, 635 W. Pine Avenue, stated he has several questions for the solicitor. He asked if a public official is absolved from their actions, can the borough go after the former mayor. Solicitor stated that it must have been for strategic reasons to drop out the former mayor from the suit, the borough at this juncture can't go after the former mayor. Mr. Thompson continued and confirmed that no punitive damages were awarded, and asked if there were any discussions about an appeal of the amount of money. Mayor Fox indicated that there were discussions, however he was worried that it would be detrimental and risky to the borough. Solicitor indicated that the time to appeal has passed on the award, but that the MEL/JIF issues will be discussed today in closed session. Mr. Thompson asked about a \$212,000.00 reduction in the jury award. Mayor Fox explained that the borough appealed the award of attorney fees and that was reduced. Mr. Thompson continued by stating the Chief was hired back at \$62,000.00 and in 2012 received a 33% raise to \$90,000.00 and in 2017 went to \$101,000.00 why? Comm. Golden stated that he researched every town, she is the lowest paid chief, with the same training. Mr. Thompson questioned the district size, number of calls and stated as a taxpayer why not look into consolidation of police services, this can be his patrol area, there would be no issue with response time. He continued stating that he is a first responder in Wildwood Crest and response time would not be impacted. Mayor Fox stated as a retired police officer of twenty-six years with Wildwood there would be issues getting coverage in the summer time west of New Jersey Avenue. Mr. Thompson questioned why such massive raises were given. Mr. Thompson wanted confirmation of two issues, first he asked if the borough is past the window to appeal the jury award. Solicitor confirmed. Second that the borough didn't give proper notification, a paperwork issue regarding MEL/JIF which was the basis for coverage denial. Solicitor clarified that MEL sited the cooperation clause. Mr. Thompson asked who will handle this

matter. Solicitor apprised him that reconsideration must be filed within fifteen days, twenty days to file the brief; the borough needs to use the same attorney.

<u>NANCY (MARINO)DOUGHERTY</u> – 215 R Avenue, asked if West Wildwood could appeal. Mayor informed her that this was best option, the state provided no help and wanted an eleven cent tax increase, instead we have a six and a half cent increase. Comm. Golden stated that one member of the LBF hinted for us to work it out, we took his advice and worked out an agreement with the chief and attorney.

<u>MARK MEIGHAN</u>, 606 W. Glenwood Avenue, asked how many of the nineteen lawsuits since 2012 have been settled and what was the payout? He commented why you didn't keep him in the lawsuit (referring to former mayor). Mayor stated that the former mayor was not involved in the trial. Mr. Meighan asked if the State Attorney General's office is investigating this suit. Comm. Golden confirmed that he was questioned regarding this matter.

<u>KATE SAMSON</u>, 205 O Avenue, asked if this went to arbitration to try to settle. Mayor stated that there was an offer to settle of \$35,000.00.

<u>MIKE DZWONIAREK</u>, 205 R Avenue, commented that the borough has seven officers, two in each car, in 1964 Bob the cop was the only cop; the crime rate is not that bad. He asked if time cards are used. Mayor stated the cops do a great job.

<u>BRUCE GEDRAITIS</u>, 641 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that he know the Mayor is dead set against the consolidation of the police department, then questioned what recourse do the taxpayers have, a petition? Solicitor informed him that one could seek a referendum, and have it go to a vote. Mr. Gedraitis asked if everyone could vote. Solicitor informed him that only registered voters are able to vote. Mr. Gedraitis asked about a referendum process. Solicitor advised him to go to a local attorney.

<u>HELEN REO</u>, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, inquired about other lawsuit settlements, investigations about claims and discussions with attorney's recommendations.

<u>SUSAN CZWALINA</u>, 547 W. Maple Avenue, asked if there could be more detail on the bill list of items. The CFO explained that every detail is not on the bill list, as our accounting system doesn't operate that way, but all the information is on the purchase order/voucher which is available anytime for the public.

<u>MIKE DZWONIAREK</u>, 205 R Avenue, asked about the meeting times switching back and forth. He inquired about dredging the canal. Mayor explained that the times changed due to the employee's furloughs on Fridays, but all commissioners agreed to change it back to Friday at 7:00pm. Comm. Golden stated that the borough along with Wildwood are looking into the dredging process.

GEORGE BAXAVANEOS, 519 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that listening, it is clear to him and the insurance that she was wrongly fired and should get her job back, but you need to defend the position, if you used the same terminology he would have paid. Mayor stated the Commissioners did what was best by law, and believes everything was okay. The Mayor continued, by stating that his brother was fired and he didn't do things properly, but if he did, he would have gotten his job back too.

<u>KATE SAMSON</u>, 205 O Avenue, questioned the cost of this lawsuit to the taxpayers and commented that you won't be able to sell your home.

<u>MARYANN WELSH</u>, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, asked if Comm. Golden could elaborate about the investigation. Comm. Golden stated that about three weeks ago two state troopers and a person from the Attorney General's office asked him some questions about the furloughs and when this all started. Ms. Welsh asked if any other municipal employees had been approached, Comm. Golden did not know.

<u>NANCY (MARINO) DOUGHERTY</u> – 215 R Avenue, commented that it is the elected official's responsibility to protect the people, and they should have done more. You (the elected officials) should have appealed the award or went through arbitration, this makes no sense. Mayor stated that we did, we went by the advice of attorney's.

<u>SUSAN CZWALINA</u>, 547 W. Maple Avenue, asked how many employees have cell phones that the borough pays. CFO informed her that there are a total of four, two each in the DPW and the PD. Ms. Czwalina wanted to know how we pay JIF. Administrator Ridings informed her that we get billed. Ms. Czwalina questioned money being paid to the fire department. CFO informed her that they do not get salaries, they are volunteers, and it is aid to the Volunteer Fire Company.

<u>MARK MEIGHAN</u>, 606 W. Glenwood Avenue, asked if it was true about a lawsuit settled for over three hundred thousand dollars for a blocked driveway and wanted to know the total amount paid for lawsuits. Mayor stated that is was, and the insurance company paid. Administrator Ridings clarified that the borough paid the deductible.

<u>HELEN REO</u>, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, stated she was surprised by the resolutions in 2012 that were passed before the jury. Solicitor clarified that the resolutions in 2012 were passed to get her job back. Ms. Reo stated that according to the Commissioner's statement from the Local Finance Board the borough took the legs out from under the insurance company for the CEPA matter. She asked if any coverage extend to punitive. The Solicitor explained that insurance does not cover wages or punitive damages. Ms. Reo commented that everything was wrongfully dismissed, and it was not up to you (the commissioners) to make that decision, a resolution was passed before the suit was finalized. Mayor stated she was wrongly treated.

DENNIS FIFE, 726 W. Poplar Avenue, addressed his question to the solicitor and wanted to know that when the Chief was brought back she should have been asked to dismiss the case. The Solicitor explained that there were actually two separate cases; employment and CEPA, she did dismiss the employment case. Mr. Fife asked who was the borough attorney, and if a mistake was made, should go after the attorney. He asked if the borough was using the same attorney. The Solicitor informed him that the solicitor at the time was Mary Bittner.

<u>STEVEN THOMPSON</u>, 635 W. Pine Avenue, wanted to clarify that there was an offer to settle the CEPA case for \$80,000.00, and the attorney's recommendation was to not appeal the decision. Mayor Fox stated that the CEPA offer was for \$35,000.00.

<u>SUSAN CZWALINA</u>, 547 W. Maple Avenue, questioned sheet 15 of the proposed 2019 budget line item for Fire Prevention. The CFO informed her that is the Fire Official/Inspector's salary.

<u>GEORGE BAXAVANEOS</u>, 519 W. Poplar Avenue, estimated the tax increase to be around \$ 2 ½ cents. Mayor confirmed.

Administrator Ridings reminded the public that there will be a meeting on Saturday, May 19, 2018 at 11:00am at the hall regarding the 26<sup>th</sup> St. project, representatives from Coastal Coalition and the Engineers will be making an information presentation. He encouraged everyone to attend.

Hearing no more public comment, the Mayor closed the public portion.

# CALENDAR YEAR 2018 ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK (N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S.A 40A:4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget up to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the Borough of West Wildwood, County of Cape May, New Jersey finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2018 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the Borough of West Wildwood, hereby determines that a 1.0% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$20,774.66 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the Borough of West Wildwood, hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Governing Body of the Borough of West Wildwood, in the County of Cape May, New Jersey, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2018 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of West Wildwood shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$72,711.30, and that the CY 2018 municipal budget for the Borough of West Wildwood be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and, BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon; be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.
