Administrator Ridings addressed questions from the Concerned Taxpayers of West Wildwood. regarding Employee wages, sewer utility budget, phone and internet services and the award of a ADA grant for ramps at the beach and police dept. Administrator Ridings also stated that there are no plans to re-schedule the monthly meetings.

REPORTS FROM COMMISSIONERS:

Mayor gave the DPW report for January 2019 (copy attached), and commented that Code Enforcement surveyed the island for sewer vent cap issues and found approximately twelve properties, and notices were sent to the owners.

Comm. Maxwell gave the finance accounts for January 2019 (copy attached)

Comm. Golden gave the PD report for January 2019 (copy attached)

Mayor opened the meeting to floor for public comment.

<u>NANCY DOHERTY</u>, 215 R Avenue, asked about employee wages, and commented when employees are off furlough and back to work full time, employees should get back the 20% loss of wages and a 2% raise.

<u>MARYANN WELSH</u>, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, asked for any updates on the living shoreline; questioned updates and time frame on the JIF appeal; and clarified that in the questions submitted it was not intended that Comm. Golden patrol, it should have stated the Chief of Police to patrol. Administrator Ridings stated a meeting with the DEP is still pending, on Monday at 9:00am a representative from the Nature Conservatory will be walking the 26th St. area. Solicitor stated that the JIF suit has been submitted, the borough is waiting to hear back and can't predict a time frame. Ms. Welsh asked how the borough will come up with the money to meet the required payments of around \$271,000.00 Comm. Maxwell stated that part of the money is from the furloughs, and is looking at the budget right now. Ms. Welsh, state she feels bad for the employees taking a twenty percent of their wages, furloughs expiring at the end of March, \$275,000.00 is a lot to come up with, good luck trying to balance your budget.

<u>CHARLES CHEPAK</u>, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, clarified that the 2% COLA would be on the rate, not on the hourly wage that was not allocated.; asked if employees are salaried, or hourly; and that the 2% would be on the rate not on what they earned, because of the furloughs wages (hours) were reduced, so the 2% COLA would be on their rates. Mayor Fox, stated, if in fact they get a raise.

<u>MARYANN ZAJAK</u>, 753 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned the \$400.00 costs from last month's meeting, Comm. Maxwell stated the cost was for lightbulbs for the holiday decorations on the poles. Administrator Ridings explained that each decoration was rehabbed.

JOE KLINE, 715 W. Poplar Avenue, asked about the sewer utility; if the borough is looking into a grant from the USDA. Administrator Ridings stated that he met last week with them and Wildwood, the USDA

look at shared services in a more positive manner, the individual from USDA said this grant is specific to the camera system and he felt that we may be able to get a fully funded grant. Mr. Kline, questioned who the person would be to run the equipment. Administrator stated that someone from Wildwood and West Wildwood would be trained on the operation of the equipment; it would have to be worked out. Mr. Kline recommends hiring a company that comes with a crew and camera and can do the entire island and fix it. Administrator Ridings stated it would be something to look into, with a fix it would be a pretty substantial bond.

<u>JOE SEGREST</u>, 2 I Avenue, inquired as to when he could see the first cut of the budget. Mayor stated it is a work in progress. Comm. Maxwell stated the borough is working on a temporary budget. Mr. Segrest asked if there is a target date. Comm. Maxwell stated he talked to the CFO; the auditors were down about two weeks ago, going through financials to go forward. Mr. Segrest commented that a dozen sewer vent caps replaced is a significate event, can cause excess, kudos to Chris. Administrator Ridings thanked Joe for his help, stating that he met with Joe and he understands flow, bringing he engineer experience, we plan on having another sit down.

HELEN REO, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned if there was any re-consideration having the police chief sign a waiver releasing the borough from any action as a result of her relationship with the Mayor. Mayor stated that question has been asked and answered many times, and referred it to Comm. Golden. Comm. Golden stated it's not a wise thing to do and referred it to the Solicitor. Solicitor there is a discussion of signing off on future rights as opposed to what has already happened, you can't sign off on future rights. Ms. Reo continued inquiring since she is no longer reporting to the Mayor to protect the borough from her filing something while she was under the Mayor, when she was a subordinate of the Mayor, why can't she be asked sign a document stating that they were in a consensual relationship. Solicitor stated that there is no way to compel that. Mayor stated that questions was asked of Bill (Blaney) we have to watch out, you and Bill need to sit down, we had this conversation before, these meeting are now being recorded, what is said and what can be held against someone, people can get in trouble. Mayor stated that what is said against personnel, we need to watch because people can get into trouble. Solicitor acknowledged new policy regarding RICE notices, stating that it is difficult to do when the questions are coming from the audience. Solicitor explained the state policy relative to RICE notice. Whenever you discuss someone in public they need to be noticed ahead of time, so we don't discuss anyone unless they are noticed, but when it comes from the audience. Mayor, we allow a lot to be said during our regular meetings, but now that it is being taped, other people are taping what is being taped, if something is said about anybody somebody could be sued over this, so be real careful about what people say about other people, because it is being taped, livestreamed, can be held against somebody, be really careful about who you're talking about, because you are open for litigation, be very careful, it's being recorded, it's on you, be careful what you say. Ms. Reo said she is asking a question about an employee. Mayor stated about personnel, again stated its being recorded, go ahead. Ms. Reo continued again asking about an employee signing a release. Solicitor stated given the fact it is not on the agenda, and the employee has not been given a RICE notice it will not be discussed publically. Ms. Reo asked that asked to put it on next month agenda; asked if there a policy that the borough has regarding employeesupervisor relationships. Solicitor state not to his knowledge, it is not a common in many municipalities. Ms. Reo questioned sexual harassment training, supervisor, supervisee training. Solicitor informed her that there is sexual harassment training, but no policy regarding relationships among employees. Ms. Reo questioned why the borough does not one. Solicitor stated it is not something that was adopted. Ms. Reo asked why no policy. Solicitor stated it is not a common thing encountered. Ms. Reo commented that one hasn't been adopted but there is an issue an ongoing matter that we have been dealing with. Solicitor stated he is not aware of any issue that has arisen over that, Mr. Chepak then interjected his comments as follows:

CHARLES CHEPAK, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, stated that it cost us a million seven, Mayor stated that was a previous administration that cost us a lawsuit, don't make this something that it isn't, there was an lawsuit file by an officer from a previous administration, that flowed into this administration, the jury awarded that money, it's not apples and apples, you are wrong. Mr. Chepak commented that he thought the lawsuit from the chief was against the borough was nepotism, that is an event, a lawsuit, how do we prevent that from happening again; there is nepotism throughout public government, and there should be an nepotism ordinance. Solicitor stated that nepotism ordinances are specific about blood relations and the claim that arose in this instance had nothing to do with a relationship, it was a claim with regard to the way a prior administration treated that individual, and the complaint was filed against that administration. Mr. Chepak, asked if there was not a history of lawsuits, bring suits against the borough, so why can't we protect ourselves further by having some form of ordinance to protect us, we know there is no armslength regarding their relationship, it's there, it's intimate, the mayor of the city... Mayor Fox interrupted and questioned what Mr. Chepak statement of intimate has asked him what he means by intimate. Mr. Chepak, stated it's your partner. Mayor asked how he knows that. you are specifically saying that intimate. Mr. Chepak stated it would all be hear-say. Mayor stated that is right it is hear-say. Solicitor again explained that the claim was against another administration about the way an employee was treated, these are two different things. Mr. Chepak asked if the borough is completely protected if the chief of police could bring something against the mayor. Solicitor stated who could foresee all of the potential events that could occur in which someone could file a claim. Mr. Chepak questioned the terms of a premutual agreement which is for a future event. Solicitor explained that both parties enter into a pre-nuptial agreement consensual agreement, done voluntarily; we do not have the ability to compel employees to enter into such an agreement.

Ms. Reo asked if she could continue, and asked if she could have a copy of the employee handbook. Solicitor stated to OPRA it. Ms. Reo continued, questioned the latest lawsuit Mawhinney, a lot of allegations in that suit about the relationship between the mayor and chief, putting the borough at risk. Solicitor stated as he understands it that suit doesn't stem from any relationship issues, but from particular complaints about what he was directed to do certain things. Ms. Reo questioned Comm. Golden on the resolutions passed to re-instate the police chief, disciplinary actions in the past, what documentation supported the actions taken. Comm. Golden stated at a previous meeting he read a list back in September, I sent letters to the Government Services, DCA, Attorney General's Office; I answered that back in September. Ms. Reo asked if it was something used during the trial and wants copies of the letters. Comm. Golden stated he didn't know, and doesn't have copies, and directed her to go to the Attorney General's Office. Ms. Reo asked if any other reports done and questioned a report reference in the trial transcripts that was done by Chris Ridings. Ms. Reo questioned Administrator Ridings, if he was an employee when this report was done. Administrator Ridings stated he was employed, he review everything that was done, the facts that happened. Ms. Reo asked if the report that was prepared by Chris Ridings used to support the actions to pass the resolutions. Administrator Ridings stated she should direct that question to the commissioners, as he doesn't answer for them. Ms. Reo directed the question to the commissioners, asking if the report was used to reinstate the police chief and eliminate the disciplinary actions. Commissioners don't recall the time frame. Ms. Reo requested to see the report. Solicitor will have to confer with counsel that is handling the litigation pending at the appellate division to see if it was part of that record, he would have an answer at the next meeting. Mayor stated that if it is allowed to be released, he hopes it does get released. Ms. Reo commented that in the follow-up questions of the CTWWW, would the Commissioner's reconsider changing the meeting date and time back to Friday night. Mayor stated that this is only the second meeting at 3:00pm, we stayed with Friday night meetings, furloughs could continue, there is no consideration to move the dates back to Friday. Ms. Reo questioned why, what does one have to do with the other. Mayor commented to Comm. Maxwell about his concerns about the clerk, with Fridays.

Ms. Reo continued stating that at a previous meeting it was brought up the borough is closed Friday evening anyway. Mayor stated that you remember my comment from a few meetings ago, that the clerk needed to get a job to make up the money and she had to work Friday night and we were inconveniencing her, by doing that, remember that. Ms. Reo stated that she remembers Donna saying she had no issues with Friday night, she said that during the meeting, because you asked her about it. Mayor stated he recalls that, he will not discuss the discussions he had with the clerk, will assure you that I would not be agreeing with this is there weren't concerns with Friday nights. Ms. Reo commented instead of thinking about an individual who can be transcribed the meeting at any time, think about what is best for the taxpayer.

CHARLES CHEPAK, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, stated that it cost us a million seven, Mayor stated that was a previous administration that cost us a lawsuit, there was an lawsuit file by an officer from a previous administration, that flowed into this administration, the jury awarded that money, it's not apples and apples. Mr. Chepak commented that he thought the lawsuit from the chief was against the borough; questioned nepotism, that is an event, a lawsuit, how do we prevent that from happening again; there is nepotism throughout public government, and there should be an nepotism ordinance. Mr. Chepak asked if the borough is completely protected if the chief of police could bring something against the mayor. Solicitor stated who could foresee all of the potential events that could occur in which someone could file a claim. Mr. Chepak questioned the terms of a pre-mutual agreement which is for a future event. Solicitor explained that both parties enter into a pre-nuptial agreement consensual agreement, done voluntarily; we do not have the ability to compel employees to enter into such an agreement.

FRED SCHWEIKERT, 521 W. Maple Avenue, referenced 2012 resolutions regarding the Ferentz lawsuit filed, dismissing charges and questioned why and who voted on absolving charges for wrong doing; questioned pension irregularities. Mr. Schweikert questioned why the borough lawyer did not challenge these charges, or why didn't the lawyer (Miss Bittner) ask questions. Mayor Fox stated that Mary Bittner was the borough solicitor; Lou Barbone was the attorney handling the case. Mr. Schweikert questioned again if the borough lawyers ever challenge the charges and stated passing the resolutions gave an open door, hoping JIF would pay. Solicitor stated that this case is in the appeal process and advised not to discuss this matter. Mayor explained that the Mr. Barbone handled the case the way he felt best, there is more to this that would take hours to explain. Mr. Schweikert stated that the commissioners are missing his point; the resolution stated that no past charges could be used against her in court.

<u>SUSAN CZWALINA</u>, 547 W. Maple Avenue, referenced the CTWWW letter regarding employees' wages; bringing employees back from furloughs and give back the 20% loss wages, bringing back to where wages were before furloughs. Ms. Czwalina questioned the temporary budget; asked when the budget if the budget would be introduced in March; clarified that the letter should state police chief not police commissioner should patrol; questioned shared services for police dispatch, EMS and asked if county dispatch would eliminate the \$35,000.00; asked if the County dispatch was mandatory; asked about NWPD dispatch; costs for agreements for 2019 with Wildwood. Mayor stated the County would charge something; County dispatch is not mandatory; stated Wildwood does a good job, great service and

response time for 9-1-1 calls with back-up and rescue. Comm. Maxwell stated that the County is on a different radio frequency and there would be costs for new mobile radios prior to switching. Ms. Czwalina questioned an OPRA (Open Public Records Access) request regarding the West Wildwood Volunteer Fire Company's Budget, commenting that she didn't get the document. Clerk informed the public that she did get that information. Ms. Czwalina then acknowledged she did, and continued with concerns that the West Wildwood Vol. Fire Company and Ladies Auxiliary do not pay for the renting of the borough hall and stated they are not an entity of the borough because they are separately incorporated, non-profit. Ms. Czwalina continued stating that the CTWWW (Concerned Taxpayers of West Wildwood) are a non-profit and compared the CTWWW to the West Wildwood Vol. Fire Company and Ladies Auxiliary asking to have the \$100.00 hall rental fee waived. Mayor Fox stated if that was the case every non-profit would want the hall for free; the WWVFC is insured through the borough.

<u>JOE SEGREST</u>, 2 I Avenue, commented that if the Fire Company is a separate entity, why the Commissioner's pass a resolution to bring on a new member. Solicitor stated the Fire Company renders services to the borough and are insured through JIF.

<u>CHARLES CHEPAK</u>, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned the status of a non-profit; questioned the attorney regarding nepotism and read aloud the definition of nepotism. Solicitor stated relative to municipalities, nepotism generally means relative, he will look into it. Mr. Chepak, stated it includes friendships. Mr. Chepak, stated he doesn't want to be miss-led, he heard something that contradicts what he has heard. Mayor interrupted and stated if this is nothing to do with the borough, and is about his relationship with someone you should not be asking the question. Mr. Chepak continued asking the Mayor if he is or is not in a co-habitative relationship with the Chief of Police. Mayor stated again it is a personal matter and you should not be asking, and again stated that this meeting is being recorded, and cautioned Mr. Chepak about what he is saying, and stated he will not answer any questions about his relationships, stated that the borough is being run very well.

<u>MARYANN WELSH</u>, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, asked to reconsider waiving the rental fee for the CTWWW and stated that this is discrimination, because the CTWWW is non-profit and would provide all the necessary documentation; commenting that the Fire Company is not part of the borough. Solicitor asked that the CTWWW submit a written request along with their documents. Mayor stated that any non-profit would then want to use the hall.

<u>CHARLES CHEPAK</u>, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, put it in the notes to ask if the chief put on notice to discuss. Solicitor stated we'll take it under advisement and explained requisite notice of an employee.

<u>HELEN REO</u>, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, again asked about a waiver being signed by the chief and mayor during the time period when the chief was under the supervision of the mayor; asked if the report done by Chris Ridings can be provided.

<u>SUSAN CZWALINA</u>, 547 W. Maple Avenue, questioned the police activity report 478 calls. Comm. Golden stated he would give her a copy. Ms. Czwalina questioned why seven police officers are needed; why the chief doesn't patrol. Comm. Golden stated that there are seven officers doing three shifts 24/7; the chief does administrative work, overseeing training, courses, paperwork, etc. Ms.Czwalina questioned the breakdown of the trust other account totaling \$77,000.00; questioned the cost of the walkway bricks of \$75.00 and wanted to know if the CTWWW could get a discount for their members. Administrator Ridings stated that the fee charged covers the cost of the brick.

Mayor asked if there are any more comments.

<u>CHARLES CHEPAK</u>, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, stated he would like to vouch for the 9-1-1 system as his wife was cleaning and hit the memory button on 9-1-1, the dispatcher called back the home and stated there was a dropped call and that a police officer is at his front door and needs to come in and check things out. Mayor stated that is a good thing, immediately they were there and appreciates it. Comm. Maxwell also informed the public that a resident called with a cardiac issue and the police arrived with an AED and had pulses back on that individual before rescue arrived.

<u>BOB BRADLEY</u>, 645 W. Glenwood Avenue, questioned if the borough has public bid openings. Mayor confirmed. Mr. Bradley questioned the lighting. Mayor informed him that the bulbs were ordered for the Christmas lighting on the poles, \$400.00. Mr. Bradley questioned when the street lighting was last changed. Mayor stated he would have to check with the electric company, and there is a charge for LED. Mr. Bradley stated that there are rebates and he would do it for free, and design it correctly, it wouldn't take a day.

<u>SUSAN CZWALINA</u>, 547 W. Maple Avenue, asked what RICE stands for. Solicitor explained that it is a name of a matter, arose from a particular situation in which Rice was one of the parties. Ms. Czwalina questioned if the sign at the bridge is turned off for the winter. Mayor Fox explained that a circuit board went bad and we are waiting for the parts and it will be up and running.

<u>CHARLES CHEPAK</u>, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned if the rest of the borough are getting yellow lines painted like on 26th Street, blocks out driveways. Mayor stated due to the width of streets. Mr. Chepak asked that about boats parked on the street (26th St.). Mayor stated that is the City of Wildwood where those boats are parked.

Hearing no more public comment, the Mayor closed the public portion. Clerk asked for a motion to adjourn.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Borough of West Wildwood, in the County of Cape May, State of New Jersey as follows:

Section 1. For the purposes of this Ordinance a trailer or camp car ("camp car" also known as motor home and recreational vehicle) is hereby defined to be any vehicle used or intended for use as a conveyance upon the public streets or highways; and shall include, but not be limited to, self-propelled and non-self- propelled vehicles so designed, constructed and reconstructed or added to by means of accessories in such a manner so at to permit the occupancy thereof as a temporary dwelling or sleeping place for one or more persons and having no foundation other than wheels, jacks or skirting so arranged as to be integral with or portable by said trailer or camp car.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, including business associations, corporations, partnerships and other entities, to park any non-self-propelled trailer or camp car on any street or any premises within the limits of the Borough of West Wildwood, except for the purpose of then and there loading and unloading thereon or therefrom, which will be limited to a 36 hour time frame. Any such trailer undergoing repairs or being stored shall be kept completely within a building and shall not, during such period of repairs or storage, be used by any person(s) as a dwelling or sleeping place or a place of temporary or permanent habitation, including the housing or sheltering of animals.

Section 3. Any self-propelled camp car may be parked on private property as long as it complies with the following criteria:

- a. It does not encroach, impede or obstruct any sidewalk;
- b. It does not encroach on neighboring property;
- c. Camp car must be currently registered and insured;
- d. Camp car must be parked on a paved surface accessed by a driveway apron;
- e. Camp car must be operable;
- f. Camp car cannot be used as a dwelling, sleeping place, place of temporary or permanent habitation which includes the housing or sheltering of animals;
- g. Camp car will not be used for storage;
- h. Camp car will be maintained and kept in good visible order;
- i. Camp car must be moved every six months.

Section 4. Any other Ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistencies only, shall be, and the same hereby are, repealed.

Section 5. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect and to this end, the provisions of the Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable.

Section 6. Penalties for Violations. Any person or association of persons convicted of a violation of the Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not less than One Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars or more than One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars and/or imprisonment in the County Jail for up to thirty (30) days for each offense. Each day that a violation continues after service of official notice of such violation shall be considered a separate offense subject to separate additional penalties.

Section 6. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication according to law.
