<u>2019-043 – AUTHORIZING THE READING OF THE CY2019 MUNICIPAL BUDGET BY TITLE</u> <u>ONLY</u>

Mayor opened the meeting for the public hearing on the CY2019 Budget.

The borough auditor Scott Barron, of Bowman & Company gave a summary of information regarding the CY2019 budget, explaining that the borough qualifies for local exam this year; the budget is below the levy cap. Borough is compliant with both caps. Local increase of 6.8 cents, factoring in the school district levy, results in an overall flat or slight decrease in the tax rate. Budget surplus use about 80% of available.so going in the 2020 approximately \$80-85,000.00 which should set up good going into 2020 budget.

SUSAN CZWALINA, 547 W. Maple Avenue, questioned the pension increase asking if it was due to the police officers new contract; questioned the auditor contract costs; questioned solid waste charges; questioned code enforcement O.E.; questioned shared services cost for Code Red; questioned the 5% shared services increase compared to N. Wildwood tax assessor shared service cost of \$.05; questioned sewer utility payment decreases.

JOE KLINE, 755 W. Poplar Avenue, stated this was the first time he has attended a budget hearing and inquired about the auditor presence. CFO explained that it is standard for the Auditor to be present during the budget hearing process.

MARYANN WELSH, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, asked that the balance of the (Ferentz) judgement could be put in the comment area on the user-friendly budget. Auditor stated that it could be put in the User-Friendly Budget comment section. Ms. Welsh asked about payments for bond anticipation notes; commented that the taxpayers are not getting the benefit of the decrease in school taxes.

CHARLES CHEPAK, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned the relationship between the auditors and the citizens of the borough, there should be a statement showing the beginning balance and the ending balance to make it transparent. Auditor, clarified that this is the budget, not the audit which is the financial statement, you will find that information in the audit, and explained that as the auditors file the audit and assist with the budget to make sure it complies with state statutes.

HELEN REO, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, liability could be called in tomorrow and it doesn't appear.

SUSAN CZWALINA, 547 W. Maple Avenue, when the annual financial statements will be posted on website. Auditor stated it is available.

CHARLES CHEPAK, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned sewer rates, is there any discussion about rates, and asked if the bill could be based on usage.

Hearing no more public comment, Mayor closed the public portion and stated that the Commissioners work very hard on this budget as we do every year to get a zero increase, budget looks good for next year. Comm. Golden thanked Comm. Maxwell for his work on the budget, along with Mayor Fox and Administrator Ridings.

REPORTS FROM COMMISSIONERS

Mayor asked to dispense with the commissioner's reports.

Clerk read out the budget resolution by title

Prior to opening the meeting for public comment, Mayor Fox made a statement regarding the local finance issues and wanted to clarify that they are on him, and not on Comm. Golden or

Comm. Maxwell. Mayor Fox apologized to the commissioners for what has happened, and takes full responsibility and asks for courtesy of waiting until the final outcome, they are a violation that he has to pay; he has appealed these charges; innocent until proven guilty; it was his responsibility not the other commissioners.

Mayor opened the meeting to floor for public comment.

MARK MEEHAN, 606 W. Glenwood Avenue, asked the mayor how many violations he had against him. Mayor stated there were one hundred allegations against him

DOROTHY DALTON, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that the mayor apologized to the other commissioners, and asked why not apologize to the residents. Mayor he will pay his fine, its like a motor vehicle violation. Mayor stated that he does not believe that anything he did was wrong. Ms. Dalton asked how many officers in the Police Dept. have Brady letters. Solicitor stated it is a personnel matter and it will not be discussed at this point, pending matter and it will not be addressed, when the matter is resolved it can be full disclosed.

TRISH SINNOTT, 739 W. Poplar Avenue, introduced herself as the president of the CTWWW, and stated the organization is not a political action group and handed the clerk a letter to have put into the minutes of the meeting. Ms. Sinnott was not addressing the board of commissioners, Mayor Fox asked Ms. Sinnott to state her question.

DEBBIE FOX, 634 W. Poplar Avenue, commented about the political action group asking the mayor if he stated that the CTWWW was the political action group. Mayor Fox stated he did not mention the CTWWW as the political action group. Ms. Fox stated that she is Chris Fox's wife and that her children do not have a stepmother.

KATE SAMSON, about the ethical violations. Mayor will not discuss them. Ms. Samson directed her question to Comm. Golden if they talk about things, discuss things, as maybe this is a good idea or not, Comm Golden stated he relies on legal counsel and makes his decision. Ms. Samson stated legal counsel may advise what you should do but you may choose or not choose what they say. Mayor stated that he listens to legal counsel, even if the clerk says I can't sign something or vote on this, we listen, and stated he has never went against the solicitor or the clerk in reference whether to sign something then questioned the clerk. The clerk stated that she advises the mayor when she feels he should abstain from signing a document. Mayor stated he does, and stated the local finance board is a good organization they do a good job, they take there job serious as do I, at the end of the day if they say Chris this is what your violations are this is what you have to pay, Chris Fox is going to pay that bill and we are going to move on, they are not crimes, I didn't intentional hurt any one in this borough I'm trying to do a job that benefits the borough and will always do that from my heart.

HELEN REO, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that the mayor indicated that you never didn't take legal advice but what about the resolutions that reinstated Jackie; back pay; making her police chief, you went against there recommendations. Mayor stated he does not have the resolutions in front of him and stated he does not believe he signed anything. Ms. Reo stated he didn't sign them, the other two commissioners did, and stated the mayor's hands are clean.

Ms. Reo questioned the violations; asking if there is an issue with the mayor and chief. Solicitor has given his advise and this will not be discussed. Ms. Reo questioned the solicitor if there is no ethical issue with the relationship between the mayor and the chief, that is why the mayor remained in the position overseeing the police department. Ms. Reo questioned who the political action group. Mayor stated he does not know who the group is. Solicitor will not answer the question because she mis-characterized what was said previously.

JOE KLINE, 750 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that you (mayor) made mention that you were not truthful to the commissioners by not telling them previously that you were being investigated. Mayor stated that is not what he said that he should have called the commissioners and told them, maybe I should have advised them as a courtesy. You did not inform the commissioners that you were under investigation. Mayor corrected him stating he did not advise them when the violations came out against him. Mr. Kline asked is that why Mr. Maxwell resigned. Mayor stated he believes he resigned for personal reasons. Administrator Ridings stated he resigned for family reasons.

MARK MEEHAN, 606 W. Glenwood Avenue, questioned Comm. Golden if he had a brady letter. Comm. Golden stated no, he is not a police officer. Mr. Meehan commented that the finances are doing better, budget better, and asked if it would be much better if we didn't pay for Comm. Golden's medical, a part-time employee; questioned who would replace Comm. Maxwell. Mayor stated that is something that will be talked about later, he doesn't know the rules. Mr. Meehan asked if he could nominate someone; commented the commissioners would step down, since he believes they do not have the confidence of the community. Mayor stated he has the confidence of more people then you think.

DEB FOX, 634 W. Poplar Avenue, thanked the Mayor and Commissioner for everything that they do; stated West Wildwood is beautiful borough, and is happy to live here and refuse to allow the political radical group, whoever you may be, poison our home, thank you for everything you do, happy that Chris is able to retire and spend his time concentrating for the good for this borough.

NANCY DOHERTY, 215 R Avenue, commented a few months ago she had mentioned nepotism, and you didn't think you needed it. Ms. Doherty stated she has papers from the state which show there is violation going back to 2016 in reference to hiring a child in your family, this was a violation of ethics law, this is in black and white from the state. Mayor stated that is alleged and he disagrees with it, that is why you have an appeal process, they already investigate it, the investigation is over they already violated me, innocent until proven guilty. Ms. Doherty stated the mayor was against nepotism when we mentioned it. Again as I said if by chance when this is done and the ethic board said it was a violation then I will never vote that way again, I will learn from this, but if the ethics come back and say I was right with what I did then I will continue to vote the way I vote, lets be clear. Ms. Doherty stated she is not saying the mayor is guilty, you're unethical.

CHARLES CHEPAK, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, commented so we understand the attorney gave advice in several meetings that we do not need a nepotism ordinance, Solicitor stated his comment was that there is not a requirement that a municipality adopt a nepotism ordinance. Mr. Chepak continued in light of the findings of the local finance board, he calls for Mr. Fox's resignation. Mayor state he will not

resign, be clear about that, a lot of people in this town respect what I do, I have good heart, I do the right things, I will not be resigning. Mr. Chepak stated he is looking for good government, private sector can bring anyone in, we asked about nepotism and you knew you were going to hire your daughter. Mayor stated there is transparency.

ELAINE SZYMKOWIAK, 555 W. Magnolia, go to any other city, town or borough hall in this Wildwood area and tell me there is not nepotism.

LORI PERLOFF, 651 North Drive, stated she has been coming here for several months; and questioned where was everyone when (former mayor) Frederick was in office, Chris Fox left a million dollar surplus when he left office, and at the end of Frederick's term \$784.00 and why, yes I sued the borough because he (former mayor) put an illegal barrier in front of my house and I lost a \$500,000 sale of a house.

MIKE PATANE, 731 W. Poplar, being transparent, throwing out the nepotism thing, how many applicants were there and is she going to Camden County academy. Comm. Golden stated there were two applicants, and at this point it has not been decided where she is going. Solicitor interrupted and stated at this point you are discussing a personnel issue, and you can speak directly to the commissioner outside of the meeting not in a public forum.

JANET ANTRIM, 786 W. Glenwood Avenue, commented at last month's meeting there was an approval to hire an attorney for pre-brady letter, what is the cost and which budget line item does it come out of. Comm. Golden stated he does not have a cost estimate, it comes out of legal, Administrator Ridings will get some information to you. Pending legal matter do we have any money in reserve, historically how many legal judgements had to be paid. Mayor stated that Deputy Clerk O'Hala compiled that information and administrator will get it to you. Ms. Antrim asked if you looked at the root-cause analysis if we can do anything to help council to stop the bleeding; she appreciates the zero tax increase, but stated that her taxes doubled last year; finally stating that she made a suggestion that the meeting move to Friday evenings, suggestion to shift employees from Tuesday to Friday so the meetings could move back to Fridays, and asked if there is a date when it might be considered. Mayor will not rule out the fact that they could change, but his opinion for the meetings to staying the date we have, Comm. Golden may have a different opinion.

DEBBIE FOX, 634 W. Poplar Avenue, in reference to nepotism, I just spoke to the lady from the inquirer, in her article, it stated there is no law against nepotism only that public officials should not vote on appointments or actions involving their immediate family, you are always going to find, particularly in small municipalities families in public works and police for generations and stated that out of twenty-one counties West Wildwood is the third lowest paid police department.

JANET ANTRIM, 786 W. Glenwood Avenue, commented that it goes to risk, cost analysis accountable risk, mitigate those risks. Mayor stated that Joint Insurance Fund who insures us has policies that we follow to limit risks, you can never prevent lawsuits if someone leaves or gets terminated and since 2012 to date I think this is the only one we have had, which is pretty good. Administrator also believes this is the only one.

MARYELLEN ZAJAK, 753 W. Poplar Avenue, live here permanently for three years, so I don't know what happened prior, questioned the lawsuit with chief, JIF turned us down because someone didn't defend us, and questioned who was responsible to defend us. Solicitor informed the Mayor that the question relates to a matter is pending an appeal and should not discuss that matter.

KATE SAMSON, 205 O Avenue, commented that she bought her house 9-10 years ago, I attended meetings, this happened to Mayor Frederick too, the hollering when you're upset. The million dollar surplus was spent on all those lawsuits; commented she didn't care who the mayor was, someday there will be an administration change, but once the million dollars became the taxpayers problem that changed everything, hence the reason we talk about it, if you have a family member or somebody that you are close to you are going to defend them. We are not always going to agree, we can not continue to have all of these lawsuits, there has to be a way to combat that, when a new administration comes in you lose your job; 65% of us don't have the right to vote but we pay our taxes, you have to work for all of us, when the million dollars landed in our lap regardless of how it happened, that was the change. Mayor agrees, but asked when does it stop, two years ago, zero this year, your budget is solvent, the previous administration. Everyone is on the same page, budget is solvent, this is two years ago, taxes went down a half of cent last year. But the issue of not being defended properly, that is the anger that people have, you're not listening. Mayor stated we will agree to disagree, one lawsuit since 2012 is good, its not fair to penalize somebody, be careful we are talking about an employee. Solicitor advised not to discuss the matter.

JANET ANTRIM, 786 W. Glenwood Avenue, asked what can be put into place to better manage our risk. Solicitor stated that every year the JIF does an analysis, goes over best practices, conveyed to the commissioners and the commissioners follow those recommendations.

NANCY DOHERTY, 215 R Avenue, read out from a document regarding the ethics violations, stating they are based upon reasonable facts, not frivolous, one regarding is daughter. Mayor commented it was a volunteer position, no pay, no financial benefit, she was going out to help the community, I voted yes to it, I didn't think it was an issue, but if the local finance board says he was wrong, I'll pay the fine. Mayor stated he is confident that it will come back differently. Ms. Doherty state that she is now hired it is different. Mayor stated he did not vote on it, the other commissioners did. Solicitor advised not to discuss personnel matters.

SUSAN CZWALINA, 546 W. Maple Avenue, asked about the hiring of conflict counsel and general hearing attorney, what are the currently working on. Mayor stated that they should be on staff every year so if anything comes up they can handle it. Solicitor stated there is a personnel matter pending before the hearing officer, not going to be the subject of public discussion, there will be full disclosure once the hearing officer renders his decision.

JOE KLINE, 750 W. Poplar Avenue, commented the mayor stated that we always listen to our advisors, the reason why we are here is because you didn't listen to the advice of your attorneys. Mayor stated the commissioners made a choice, one maybe better than the other. Solicitor interrupted and stated this is on appeal.

JOHN BANNING, 711 W. Poplar Avenue, questioned if we are paying the attorney to do away with the brady letter for the chief and why are we paying. Solicitor stated there is a personnel matter pending, the subject of which is not going to be discussed here, you can OPRA the bills of any counsel of record from the borough. Mr. Banning wanted it to put it on record that he is against us paying at all, because it happened prior to her coming back, we should not have to pay for it. Mr. Banning stated he has no problem with the hiring of the mayor's daughter, it happens throughout the state, but what they try to do is to keep things so above board and clear; the fact that only two applicants makes it a shady process. Mr. Banning directed his comment to Comm. Golden stating he didn't do the mayor a favor or the citizens a favor and the officer you hired. Mr. Banning stated in other towns when commissioners' step down, they take resumes and other things wanted to let the commissioner know he would be glad to take the position.

DOROTHY DALTON, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, the resolution passed last month hiring conflict attorney and this month hiring a general hearing officer, did we have those attorneys hired previously. Clerk clarified that the hearing officer was under contract in 2015. Ms. Dalton questioned why we need those attorneys. Solicitor explained the duties of each of the attorneys, and stated it is common for a municipality to have these attorneys. Ms. Dalton commented that the commissioners didn't need the additional expense or these attorneys up to this point. Mayor confirmed.

JOHN WELSH, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, asked if there was any update on the living shore line; if JIF would cover a portion of the legal to give financial relief, and if there is any time table; commented about the mayor's ethics violations, stating it was not just one thing but many over a period of time. Administrator Ridings stated that the tideland application is completed and sent to the DEP, it is a slow process, they met with the DEP, the last step is funding. Solicitor stated the JIF matter is under appeal and still waiting on a hearing date scheduled by the courts. Mayor stated if the Local Finance Board says he was wrong he will pay the fine, he did not intentionally vote on things, he thought he was right with what he did, and stated if found in violation he will pay the fine and move on, and do things differently.

CHRIS MONAHAN, 8 F Avenue, asked about changing the meeting date and time back to Friday night. Mayor said he would consider it.

ELAINE SZYMKOWIAK, 555 W. Magnolia, questioned why the previous mayor dismissed from the case. Solicitor stated this should not be discussed here because of the pending appeal, you can get the records of the court hearing.

MARK MEEHAN, 606 W. Glenwood Avenue, you choose not to vote on something, don't you need two to take a vote, aren't there bylaws. Solicitor stated there are procedures under the Walsh Act, the statue articulates the time frame, for an orderly appointment and procedure. If you only have two, and one can't vote on it.

JOE KLINE directed his comment to Comm. Golden asking if the mayor is found guilty on the ethics violations what is his feeling about the situation, since he will not resign, you are of equal authority. Comm. Golden stated he will wait to see the findings; I believe things were done above board and would rather not comment at this time. Mr. Kline stated the mayor enhance

himself and others and you're okay with that, that is what the violations say. Solicitor interrupted stating he is not the counsel to the mayor on this matter but recommends that this not be discussed.

CHARLES CHEPAK, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, asked a question of process, under our form of government does public has the option to make a motion from the floor and vote on it. Solicitor stated there is an option for the voters of the municipality for the commissioner to consider per the statute. Mr. Chepak commented about ethics violation, hiring the chief, pay raise, SUV, why would you say its okay to pay her attorney fees to help with a personnel issue, why should we pay for the removal of the brady letter. Solicitor stated that is a personnel matter not to be discussed, to insulate the borough from another suit.

HELEN REO, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, stated at the meeting hiring the conflict counsel was to specifically deal with the police chiefs brady letter, her opinion is not to pay for this attorney because it was prior to her being hired, we should not be responsible to pay for it. Ms. Reo questioned why Comm. Golden was dropped from the lawsuit. Comm. Golden stated he doesn't remember being named in the lawsuit and does not know why he was dropped.

MARYANN WELSH, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that the mayor was quoted in the Inquirer that you would be the first one to sign off for consolidations of services. Mayor corrected stating a true full merger, not departments, not services.

JOHN WELSH, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, I have attended meetings in the past, the \$1.7 million-dollar settlement got our attention, stating that the mayor used threats and fear stating they would never patrol. Solicitor explained the difference between shared services and consolidation. Mayor stated the whole island should do it, the State of New Jersey stated that any town less than 5,000 residents should merge with the next town, and a vote would have to come to the borough, the Mayor stated he has had discussions with state representatives. Mr. Welsh stated is there something in the near future, as a taxpayer he sees benefits and breaks up power making decisions and taking care of power, will hold the mayor to be the first one to sign up.

JANET ANTRIM, 786 W. Glenwood Avenue, questioned if the lawsuit is in appeal. Solicitor explained the borough is appealing the JIF coverage. If the borough is paying to have the brady letter removed.

SUSAN CZWALINA, 547 W. Maple Avenue, commented the workshop meeting have been cancelled, only one this year, this would have been a perfect opportunity to discuss Comm. Maxwell's resignation. Mayor stated that is why we have the administrator, he talks with the commissioners to see if they have anything need to have the workshop, the commissioners will say yes or no, and we come to the meeting and discuss it. Ms. Czwalina directed her question to Comm. Golden for his opinion on having the meeting on Friday. Comm. Golden stated he prefers Wednesday right now and is not against going back to Friday. Ms. Czwalina stated you keep saying you will consider it, but it is almost July, and nothing is done. Ms. Czwalina stated that the budget was really clamped down on the last two years, since the lawsuit, so does this mean we have been overpaying for years. Mayor stated absolutely not, taking departments down, not critical but they need to get back up to run things properly, and the auditor says everything is ok. Ms. Czwalina questioned what will happen when the school board does not have any more

money. Mayor stated that he does not see any issues in the future, we're doing capital improvements and feels it will all be okay.

HELEN REO, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, asked about the plan for cleaning of the beach. Mayor stated a few weeks ago volunteers cleaned up the area, when the ramp is complete it will be easier to maintain. Administrator Riding stated that there is only one corner section that still needs to be cleaned; the staff worked on it including the CFO and the Clerk, it should be done next week, it is a lot to do, it is not dry, once the ramp is in place it will be much easier.

RITA DURST, 534 W. Pine Avenue, commented that she is a year 'round resident and does not want to merge with Wildwood, she has relatives over there the taxes are horrible, we don't always agree but we have to bring this town together, we all have complaints, and stated she doesn't want to be part of Wildwood, lets stop this petty stuff, stop beating a dead horse, this is a great place to live, it is what it is, and it's a great place to live.

DEBBIE FOX, 634 W. Poplar Avenue, come together to volunteer to help clean the beach.

MARYANN WELSH, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, stated she has no desire to merge with Wildwood, North Wildwood would be better, if not merge consolidate more services like the police department with North Wildwood, it would eliminate some conflicts.

SUSAN CZWALINA, 547 W. Poplar Avenue, commented that everyone is invited to the CTWWW is hosting a meet and greet this Saturday from 5-8pm.

DOLORES BURKOWSKI, 507 W. Poplar Avenue, requested to change the meeting date to Friday night at 7, people are taking off work to attend, you changed it so people can't come so it didn't work so change it back. Mayor stated that you are not going to like his answer, his children play softball throughout the summer out of state on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. I will work on Thursday night at 7.

HELEN REO, 741 W. Poplar Avenue, commented about the meeting date, stating the mayor's responsibility is to the residents, we pay your salary, and because your children play sports, we have to continue taking time off work. Mayor stated he knew you would not like the answer. Ms. Reo asked the mayor to step down if this is such a conflict, you are putting your personal interests ahead of the taxpayers, this is what gets you into trouble.

Hearing no more public comment, the Mayor closed the public portion and asked for a motion for adjournment

ORDINANCE NO. 572 (2019)

CALENDAR YEAR 2019 ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK (N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S.A 40A:4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget up to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the Borough of West Wildwood, County of Cape May, New Jersey finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2019 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the Borough of West Wildwood, hereby determines that a 1.0% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$ 20,311.46 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the Borough of West Wildwood, hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Governing Body of the Borough of West Wildwood, in the County of Cape May, New Jersey, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2019 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of West Wildwood shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$71,090.10, and that the CY 2019 municipal budget for the Borough of West Wildwood be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon; be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.
